Percutaneous – A needle or other sharp object has penetrated the skin.

Mucocutaneous -

All SHARPS injuries must be reported to Safety@medic911.com

1. Mucous membrane - Contact of employee's mucous membrane (e.g., eyes, nose, or mouth) with a patient's fluids, such as blood, *visibly* bloody fluids, and other body fluids (i.e., semen, vaginal secretions, cerebrospinal fluid, synovial fluid, pleural fluid, peritoneal fluid, peritoneal fluid, and amniotic fluid, or tissues.

2. Non-intact skin - Contact of employee's skin with patient fluids, such as; blood, visibly bloody fluids, and other body fluids (i.e., semen, vaginal secretions, cerebrospinal fluid, synovial fluid, pleural fluid, peritoneal fluid, pericardial fluid, and amniotic fluid, or tissues. Non-intact skin is any area of the skin that is open by cuts, abrasions, dermatitis, chapped skin, etc.

Human Bite - A human bite sustained by employee that resulted in non-intact skin.
